

2011 Division Leaders

Every year, HCASC selects noteworthy African Americans to represent the round robin divisions. For 2011, religious pioneer Absalom Jones will represent the Blue Division, and abolitionist legend Sojourner Truth, will represent the Brown Division.




Absalom Jones

Absalom Jones was America's first black priest. Born into slavery, he taught himself to read, using the New Testament as one of his resources. Following the purchase of his own freedom in 1784, Jones served as lay minister for the black membership at St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church.

The active evangelism of Jones and that of his friend, Richard Allen, greatly increased black membership at St. George's. In 1794 Jones and Allen, with the assistance of local Quakers and Episcopalians, established the "First African Church" in Philadelphia. Shortly after the establishment that same year, the African Church applied to join the Protestant Episcopal Church, laying before the diocese three requirements: the Church must be received as an already organized body; it must have control over its own affairs; and Jones must be licensed as lay-reader and if qualified, ordained as its minister.

Upon acceptance into the Diocese of Pennsylvania, the church was renamed the African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas. At 58 years old, he became the first black American priest. He continued to be a leader in his community, founding a day school, the Female Benevolent Society, and an African Friendly Society. In 1800 he called upon Congress to abolish the slave trade and to provide for gradual emancipation of existing slaves. Jones died in 1818.



Sojourner Truth

Born Isabella Baumfree, the self-named Sojourner Truth was the daughter of slaves. Between 1810 and 1827 she bore at least five children to a fellow slave named Thomas. About 1829, she went to New York City with her two youngest children, where she worked as a domestic, preacher and missionary.

In 1843, she left her missionary work in New York City and took the name Sojourner Truth. She sang, preached, and debated at camp meetings, in churches, and on village streets, exhorting her listeners to accept the biblical message of God's goodness and the brotherhood of man. She supported herself by selling copies of her book, "The Narrative of Sojourner Truth."

Encountering the women's rights movement in the early 1850s, and encouraged by Lucretia Mott, she continued to appear before suffrage gatherings for the rest of her life. In the 1850s Sojourner Truth settled in Battle Creek, Michigan. During the Civil War, she gathered supplies for black volunteer regiments and was later received at the White House by President Abraham Lincoln. The same year, she accepted an appointment with the National Freedmen's Relief Association counseling former slaves, particularly in matters of resettlement. In 1875 she retired to her home in Battle Creek, where she remained until her death.
