

Perpetual "team generating machine"

Feeder system
Keeps players playing
Players improve skills from year to year
Allows many students to stay involved

Part practice session, part social club

Players make "friends for life" Balance structured practice with social interaction

Makes a regular part of members lives

Consistent schedule makes it easier for students to "remember" Creates a sense of belonging

Club members = Campus Tournament Volunteers


They know the game They have experience in game official roles

Helps build a championship caliber team


Practice makes perfect Growth from novice to seasoned player

Increases camaraderie between players and coaches

More informal setting Reduces fear and intimidation Creates better relationships between players and the coach

Draft a "statement of purpose"

Usually that includes goals, plan and structure See hcasc.com for information on the program and its history

Prepare an annual budget

Be realistic

Research the typical range given to a new club Set priorities for the budgeted costs

Name an advisor

Usually this is the campus coordinator or the coach

Name Club officers

Requirements vary by campus

Usually includes a President, Vice President and Secretary/Treasurer Other member roles can include Social Chair, Equipment Person, Outreach Coordinator, etc.


Establish a weekly meeting time and place

Secure a location where noise is not a problem; reserve it all year long Set a consistent weekly time

Schedule the time to avoid activities that compete for student's time Use email or phone calls for notifications and reminders

Register the student-based club with SGA or Student Activities

Research procedures and requirements on your campus



Invite strong players from the Campus Tournament & Power Search

The Campus Coordinator has the contact info for all players from the Campus Tournament.

Have students invite students.

Look for members where you look for players

Get a list of new students who played Quiz Bowl in High School from the registrar. Set up a table at Welcome Week activities.

Attend some General Studies classes.

Cruise the library.

Attend meetings of Honor Societies.

Show up at TV lounges during Jeopardy! and other game shows.

Hand out a club flier to all players during the campus tournament.

Encourage potential members to come "try it out"

Don't discount anyone.

Students who are enthusiastic but not great players can help out and be valuable members.

Use current club members as recruiters

Have each initial member bring in at least 2 other members.

Ask faculty for student recommendations

Invite them to join; Call or email them more than once.

Students who don't play help in other ways
Get phone, email and address for all members
Never stop recruiting! It's never too early for next year.

Weekly sessions


Throughout the school year Start the first week of school Get a dedicated space Brief sessions Maintain a consistent time period

Club funding from SGA or Student Activities

Register the organization to qualify for funding May qualify the group for a mailbox, office, meeting space, web page Possible funding for club expenses and travel to pre-NCT tournaments

Student-driven but staff-facilitated

Students suggest topics, club events & group activities Coach and/or Campus Coordinator serves as Advisor Coach and/or Club president sets the weekly training plan Students and staff work together to plan club activities



Weekly practice and drill sessions

Play old game packets
Play member-written questions
Introduce variety in weekly meetings
Play 1 on 1
Play 2-minute drills
Play specific topic games or drills

Pizza Nights and other social interactions

Bowling Have members suggest ideas

Group viewing of TV shows, movies and documentaries

African-American themed TV shows and movies History Channel & Discovery Networks PBS

Scavenger Hunt

Plan a fact-based scavenger hunt with clues hidden across campus

Online Game or "Biggest Brain" contest

Track members scores on the online games
Print out scores when your student makes it to the Top 5
Use other websites like Sporcle.com

Local Trivia Night contests

Sign up for local contests run in local establishments. Make it a learning and social experience.



Special games during campus events

Run special theme competitions for other students During Homecoming, Parents Weekend, Founders Weekend, Black History Month, Women's Studies Month, Caribbean/Pan American Festival

Board Game Night

Trivial Pursuit Who Wants To Be A Millionaire Jeopardy!

Tape and watch a week's worth of a game show together Play online games like those at MSN Game Zone

Question writing session

Spend time in the library or computer lab researching and writing questions Have members read and critique one another's questions New template is available online

To museums, archives and historical sites
